REC 1000	Introduction to Leisure Services. Introduction to concepts, definitions, and central issues relevant to recreation
	and leisure. Exploration of factors influencing leisure. Overview of the delivery of leisure and recreation services.
	Field Work Required
REC 2000	Program Planning for Leisure Services. This course examines the principles, components, and process of planning
	leisure experiences and recreation programs.
REC 2010	Philosophy of Leisure and Recreation. Study of the philosophical foundations of leisure, recreation, and play,
	which encompass the historical development of the field of recreation and leisure services. Introduction to the
	literature and critical examination of leisure concepts and theories. Writing emphasis course.
REC 2070	Use of Technology for PE and Recreation Professional. Application of technology and personal computer use for
	the physical education teacher and the recreation professional. Use of word processing, spreadsheet, statistical,
	fitness, and other profession specific software. Familiarization with Internet applications and the construction of a
	home page.
REC 2200	Leadership and Supervision in Leisure and Recreation. Leadership is an integral part of the delivery of recreation
	and leisure services. Leadership and supervision theories, techniques, and skills will be explored. Topics to be
	addressed include direct leadership, communication, conflict resolution and discipline, motivation, human resource
	management, risk management, and professionalism. This course provides traditional instruction as well as
	experiential learning opportunities that facilitate the development of operational skills in leadership, group
	dynamics, and supervision. Field Work Required
REC 4000	Facility Management and Design. This course introduces the basic concepts of leisure facility planning and design
	and examines the relationship between facility design and operational management. Students will examine issues
	pertaining to the design and management of public and private open spaces and facilities.
REC 4240	Management of Leisure Service Delivery Systems. This course examines the critical functions of a manager in
	public and private leisure service organizations. Topics to be addressed include professionalism, human resource
	management, fiscal management, facility management, community and public relations, and legal issues and

REC 4300	Overview of Therapeutic Recreation Services. An exploration of therapeutic recreation in community and clinical settings. An overview of the philosophical concepts of therapeutic recreation, pertinent legislation and different disability groups. Awareness of the roles of the therapeutic recreation specialist, other leisure services providers, and human service providers in addressing the needs of persons with disabilities.  Field Work  Required			
REC 4500	Program Evaluation and Research in Leisure and Recreation. This course provides an overview of research concepts, approaches, methods, and techniques relevant to recreation and leisure services. Emphasis will be placed on program evaluation. Students will explore current research and develop a research proposal. <b>Field Work Required</b>			
REC 4540	Seminar and Methods for Recreation Field Introduction to field experience including techniques, methods and practices used. Exposure to practical application issues and trends in various recreation settings via readings, site visits, field work, guest speakers, and interaction with professionals. Identification of potential fieldwork site. Development of portfolio. Writing emphasis course. <b>Fieldwork required</b> (50 hours).
